


Part 7







Those cobblestones were very difficult to walk on from the bus parking lot to the entrance of the palace.











Louis XIV was known as the "sun king" and below you can see the sun icon on the fences outside the palace.







Apparently there are over 700 rooms. We only visited the ones of major historical importance. Once again we saw a lot of painted ceilings and artwork.























This is a bust statue of Louis XIV.































Then we approached the famous hall of mirrors.




The hall of mirrors leads into the King's Chamber, which consists of the Bull's-Eye Room, the King's Chamber and the Council Study.














Another bust statue of Louis XIV in the King's Bedroom.








Then we went in to the Queen's

ANTECHAMBER OF THE GRAND COUVERS

The Queen's Guard Room until 1680, it became the first antechamber of the Queen's apartment, where the King and Queen took their meals in public. Marie-Antoinette gave concerts and balls and held her grand dinner service here. The royal couple "dined" in front of the Court on Sundays and on days when ceremonies took place.

The ceiling paintings, 1678 - 1681, were restored thanks to the support

in the centre: Henri Testelin (after Charles Le Brun),
Darius's Tent or The Family of Darius at the Feet of

Other than being huge in size I didn't think the garden was all that nice. None of the fountains were working. Perhaps if the fountains were on, it would have looked nicer.





















Francois drove us back on the tour bus to our hotel, where we freshened up and met in the lobby to get back on the bus to go to the restaurant for our farewell dinner.










It was dusk, and going under all the many bridges was a fun experience. The sound really does echo off the underneath of the bridges.






I got a much better view of Notre Dame from the boat than from the bus.

















People on the shore would wave to our boat, other boats would wave to us and we would wave back all along our route on the Seine.






A closer look at the building above where Marie Antoinette was imprisoned for 2 months before her beheading.






A beautiful close-up look at the awesome bridge with the large golden statues and old fashioned ornate lights.












Every bridge is different and underneath is also different.





Views of the Eiffel Tower from the boat.















We came across this unique building with an actual garden growing on its side. There was some sort of irrigation system on the side of the building to water it.




We stopped to pose by the wall garden. I later noticed the next morning at the airport that there was a very similar wall garden by my departure gate.




We made our way to the base of the Eiffel Tower. Just across the street here by the river Seine were carousels and a sort of street fair with venders of all sorts.









